



## Judith Irene Ghent

August 2, 1952 - January 2, 2026

Judith Irene Ghent (Judi) passed away the morning of January 2, 2026, at age 73 in Lehi, Utah. She was born on August 2, 1952 in Chicago, Illinois to Gertrude and Harold Davis. She married Robert Ghent, Jr. (Bob) in Manhattan Beach, California on October 1, 1977. Their marriage was later solemnized for eternity in the Los Angeles temple of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints.

Judi was raised in a vibrant home with the Jewish traditions of her ancestors. Her parents steeped their children in a love of education, literature, and the arts. Judi moved with her family from Chicago to Los Angeles as a teenager. During her middle school and high school years Judi developed a love for writing and music, which led to a profuse creation of poetry, prose, and songs. She studied piano, voice, and French literature at UCLA before leaving school to start her family after having converted to The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints and meeting Bob. Early in her marriage to Bob she worked as a production assistant on TV shows for 20th Century Fox. Later in her life she studied acting and had parts in several BYU films, portraying a Jewish woman in Palestine during the time of Jesus. While Judi continued her artistic endeavors throughout her life, they took a backseat to the raising of her children.

Judi is survived by her husband of 48 years, Bob, and her children Sarah

Warren (Jason) of Orem, Utah; Holly Massey (Tyler) of American Fork, Utah; Gabriel Ghent (Elya) of Orem, Utah; and Jacqueline Ghent of Highland Utah. She is also survived by her beloved eleven grandchildren as well as a sister, Deborah, and a brother, Kenneth.

Judi was preceded in death by her parents, Harold and Gertrude.

A funeral service for Judi will be held on Wednesday, January 14, 2026, at The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints chapel located at 9621 North 6050 West, Highland Utah, at 11:00 a.m. Visitation will be at 10:00 a.m. Internment at the Highland City Cemetery will immediately follow the funeral service.

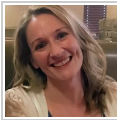
